Local Policing Priorities



Road Safety and Road Crime

Intention - With Partners, enhance Road Safety across the Highland Area.

Objective – With Partners, deliver a Road Safety Strategy focusing on: Challenging driver behaviour; Education at the roadside and elsewhere; Detection of offences linked to contributing factors of Fatal and Serious Road Traffic Collisions and collectively reducing potential harm.

Local officers and Road Policing officers continue to proactively patrol Ward 6's road network which is beginning to become busier as we approach the summer months.

Three motorists were arrested on suspicion of drug driving, having been stopped in Alness and Evanton. We await the result of laboratory analysis to determine whether these persons are charged.

We have detected three speeding offences, with one motorist recorded travelling at 70mph in a 50mph zone. That motorist was reported to the Procurator Fiscal. In additional, officers stopped a motorist in the Ardross area who was charged with three bald tyres and an obstructed view from the windscreen.

Fatal 5 (speeding, seatbelts, mobile phones, drink/drug driving and careless driving) days of action have also been conducted across Highland, including Ward 6.

Anti-Social Behaviour, Disorder and Violence

Intention – With Partners, better understand the causes to prevent and reduce instances of Anti-Social Behaviour, Disorder and Violence to enhance community safety across the Highland Area.

Objective – Work with Partners to share information, support Education, Prevention, Diversionary and Enforcement Measures linked to harmful alcohol consumption; maintain robust procedures around licensed premises; support victims of violent crime by working with partners to improve service provision and prevent repeat victimisation.

Alcohol related violence, domestic violence and violence towards the Police are the biggest issues in this section for June. Police Scotland is committed to effectively dealing with perpetrators of violence and will not tolerate violence of any kind towards its officers. Perpetrators of such incidents will always be dealt with robustly and reported to the courts where there is sufficient evidence.

Assault has featured prominently in June, with twenty-seven separate offences recorded, however most resulted in minor or no injury. These offences have occurred within residential addresses in Alness and Invergordon, as well as public places. We have successfully detected nineteen of these offences by way of arrest and subsequent report to the Procurator Fiscal or referral to the Children's Reporter.

There have been six reported offences of vandalism within Alness and Invergordon for this period. Offences include damage to cars and windows of houses. We have also identified a suspect in connection with a spate of graffiti at several locations within Alness, with enquiries at an advanced stage.

Acquisitive Crime

Intention – With Partners and Communities, prevent instances of acquisitive crime across the Highland area.

Objective – With Partners, share information, support education, prevention, diversionary and enforcement activity linked to acquisitive crime; develop work with targets – recidivist offenders to reduce reoffending linked to acquisitive crime e.g. Persistent Offenders programme; enhance the use of all media platforms to raise awareness of local and national preventative initiatives.

We have investigated and detected six offences of theft of alcohol from a local supermarket – the suspect has been arrested and reported. Police Scotland will continue to work with shops and supermarket security teams to assist in increasing their security measures and preventing instances of shoplifting.

We are also investigating a break-in to a residential address in Invergordon. Our enquiries are ongoing to identify a suspect. We encourage our communities to consider additional home security such as installing camera doorbells or alarm systems.

Online fraud continues to be a cause for concern, with a company reporting a high-value offence, which is currently under investigation.

We urge our communities to remain vigilant – fraud can be committed in person, online or via telephone. Further advice can be found at Police Scotland

OFFICIAL

Protecting Vulnerable People

Intention – Protect people at risk of harm.

Objective – With Partners and as corporate parents we will deliver the Highland CHAMPS (Highland Champion Board) strategy; with Partners we will focus on safeguarding communities; with Partners we will address emerging issues through Prevention and Intervention.

There is nothing specific to report for June under this section however, protecting vulnerable people remains a priority for local officers. Calls regarding concern for person and mental health related incidents are attended frequently. These calls can have quite an impact on local resources however there is currently a review ongoing at executive level to ensure Police Scotland are providing the most appropriate response to these types of incidents. Serious and Organised Crime

Intention – With Partners, reduce the threat, risk and harm caused by Serious Organised Crime.

Objective – With Partners work to safeguard the Highland area by taking all opportunities to prevent crime and make the Highland area a hostile environment for Serious & Organised Crime Groups; to improve outcomes for individuals and communities and reduce offending through prevention, early intervention and diversion; in support of our Partners in the Local Authority and NHS via the Highland Alcohol and Drug Partnership Strategy we will direct those who are substance dependant towards recovery through prevention, treatment and support services; with Partners work to reduce the instances of substance misuse in our communities.

There have been four offences of possession of controlled drugs, ranging from Class A to Class C. One individual was dealt with by way of Recorded Police Warning for being found with a small amount of herbal cannabis. The other offences form part of another case but are expected to be detected soon.

Officers continue to record and act upon all intelligence submitted to Police Scotland in regards to serious and organised crime and encourage public to report suspicious activity via contact us form on the website or via 101.

Counter Terrorism

Intention – Support the delivery of the CONTEST strategy to reduce the threat posed by terrorism and domestic extremism.

Objective – Strengthen PREVENT work with Partners and institutions; with Partners, support individuals who are vulnerable to terrorism and violent extremism; strengthen PREVENT work in relation to the internet and Social Media; Effective Multi-agency planning in respect of Counter Terrorism is taking place; Develop our ability to response effectively to any terrorist attack (with a specific focus on emerging high-risk threats, and specialist capabilities).

ACT Early is a program delivered to schools across the Highland area. The ACT Early session is a vehicle for debate around the sensitive issue of violent extremism within communities. As such it is an enabler for community participants to air grievances, debate matters of interest to them and work through a group problem solving experience.
